Māori is a phonetic language that is reasonably simple to pronounce. The key to correct pronunciation is to master the sounds of the five vowels.



TE WHAKAHUA TE REO PRONUNCIATION

- The vowel **a** is pronounced as cut in English
- The vowel **e** is pronounced as <u>egg</u> in English
- The vowel i is pronounced as key in English
- The vowel **o** is pronounced as p<u>aw</u> in English
- The vowel u is pronounced as shoe in English



TE WHAKAHUA TE REO PRONUNCIATION

- The vowel **ā** is pronounced as c<u>ā</u>r in English
- The vowel **e** is pronounced as pear in English
- The vowel **ī** is pronounced as <u>ee</u>l_in English
- The vowel **ō** is pronounced as pour in English
- The vowel **ū** is pronounced as r<u>oo</u>f in English

FORMAL LETTER OR EMAIL

Tēnā koe (Name) - Dear (Name) - greeting one person.

Tēnā kōrua - Greeting two people. Don't insert names.

Tēnā koutou - Greeting three or more people.





INFORMAL LETTER OR EMAIL

Note: Kia ora can mean hello, good morning, good afternoon & thank you

Kia ora - Hello, any number of people

Kia ora kōrua - Hello to two people

Kia ora koutou - Hello to three or more people

Mōrena / ata mārie - Good morning

SIGN OFFS



Na - From

Nāku, nā - Yours faithfully

Nāku iti noa, nā - Yours sincerely

Ngā mihi - Kind regards / thank you

Ngā mihi nui - Kind regards (with more emphasis on gratitude)

Hei konā mai - Goodbye for now

Mā te wā - Bye for now / see you later

Noho ora mai - Stay well / look after yourself / good bye

Kia pai tō rā - Have a nice day
